

CLERGY LETTER

Stories of Reconciliation

This month our focus is less on traditions of fasting than on feasting on stories, listening afresh to how God can speak to us in many ways, as I discovered for myself recently as I re-read a story that I've listened to or read many times from childhood onwards.

It was the story of twin brothers, Esau and Jacob: Jacob cheats his elder brother of things that were rightly his, and then flees for his life. He found refuge with his uncle in another country, but in turn was cheated by him. Eventually the friction between uncle and nephew drove him to risk returning home. He made careful preparations for the re-union, sending messengers with peace offerings for his brother. When the two came face to face, Esau, to Jacob's surprise, ran to meet him, embraced him and wept with joy. He refused the peace offerings until his brother persuaded him, saying, " ... if I find favour with you, then accept my present from my hand; for truly to see your face is like seeing the face of God—since you have received me with such favour." (Genesis 33.10).

I had never before noticed the phrase which I've underlined. Tears welled up as I read and re-read them, for this, like the better-known story of the Prodigal Son, transported me into the presence of God: the one who runs to meet us, weeps with joy when we seek to make our peace with him and blots out all our past wrongs that wound him. This is also the message we hear in services during the final week of this month, culminating in the celebration of Easter as we follow the story of Jesus's death and resurrection.

At the beginning of the month, we will be welcoming Year 5 and 6 pupils, from all the schools in the Vale and other schools in the area, to the Life Exhibition. This offers them other ways to hear the story of the life of Jesus through videos and interactive technology.

Throughout the month we also continue our programme of talks and services, relating how silence and scripture, art and music, can help us hear God's story of reconciliation: That through Jesus Christ, "God was "pleased to reconcile to himself all things, whether on earth or in heaven, by making peace through the blood of his cross" (Colossians 1.20)

May this story bring hope and joy to all this Easter, amidst the heartbreak of the ongoing conflicts and horrors that we witness today.





NURTURE NATURE

It is good to view on some popular TV programmes about land use and the countryside recently emphasis being placed on how important hedges are for wildlife – for birds, bats, insects, a host of mammals and also providing shelter for livestock. Should one have old hedges that require rejuvenating and bulking up, or desire to plant new hedges, there is plenty of information on the internet, on the TV and on catchups. It's not too late to act, and with patience and perseverance you will have added further lengths of wildlife corridors. Smaller areas can benefit too, such as your garden borders. Hedges don't blow down fences do, as experienced by some in the recent gales. You can help to protect your fences by planting suitable hedging species as buffers, preferably deciduous ones. Leylandii are not user friendly for most species, except as roosting sites for some. I think we have all been quite shocked to learn recently that one in five migration species are facing extinction over the next few decades, and global migration corridors are being interrupted and partially destroyed due to uncontrolled population expansion -man's ignorance and over development thus threatening species such as the long annual migration of wildebeest in Africa. Monarch butterflies from Canada and north east North America migrate 3,000 miles to the forests of S W Mexico and S W America. Uncontrolled destruction of forests on all the populated continents is leading to tipping points which will adversely affect the world as we think we know it. The wake up calls have been, and are being made. We need to respond. The Woodland Trust makes an excellent contribution to increasing tree numbers in the UK by arranging planting days for volunteers, schools, local organisations and others, so let's get planting. Remember when some of us older readers were growing up we were taught at our junior schools how important trees are, especially the world's rain forests, as they are the 'lungs of the earth'. We must do all we can to keep them so. Some of you will be surprised to learn that in the British Isles there are sites classified as rain forests. I won't spoil your fun, you can search for them on the internet. What a loss to our enjoyment of nature it would be if there were no woods and forests – "If you go down in the woods today, you're sure of a big surprise -If you go down in the woods today, you'd better go in disguise for every bear that ever there was will gather there for certain because today's the day the teddy bears have their picnic" .(John Walter Bratton 1907). At Gleann Shildeag (in the north west highlands of Scotland) the WT and helpers are clearing the invasive undergrowth and are aiming to plant nearly 120,000 saplings – a mixture of native willow and birch, with some alder and oak - before the end of the month. When matured, this should give the red squirrel population a good boost, and many other species of wildlife too. Avian flu is still having a destructive effect on seabirds, the Great Skua (Bonxie) around the northern Scottish coasts and the gannet population on Grassholm Island west Wales are still being adversely affected. So, nearer to home it is imperative that bird baths and feeders are kept scrupulously clean. A mild mixture of warm water and washing up liquid

will do the job. Although our seasons are not as they used to be, it is pleasing to see acres of woodland snowdrops, dancing daffodils (earlier than usual) and flowering shrubs and trees such as prunus, mahonia, winter flowering honeysuckle and abelia as spring nears.

Ed: One way to increase diversity is to plant daffodils. I planted some in the grass outside my house, so that the council mowed it later than usual, when the daffodils had died down.

Lo and behold, up popped wild orchids.

The March lecture of The Arts Society - Pewsey Vale, will be held on Tuesday 5th March at 2.30pm in the Bouverie Hall. This month we will hear from Lynne Gibson whose lecture is entitled "Alchemy and Adventure: A History of Exotic Colours and Poisonous Pigments".

In our modern world it's easy to take colour for granted. Yet before organic chemistry the most desirable pigments were often exotic or poisonous. Merchants supplied pungent yellow 'purree' nuggets from India, cochineal 'grana' from the holds of Spanish galleons, lapis rock carried by camel train from the mountains of Badakhshan. Alchemists prepared deadly 'King's Yellow' and 'ruby of arsenic'. 'Moorish Gold' was concocted, according to a 12th century monk, from basilisk powder ground with human blood! Small wonder artists kept their paint recipes closely guarded in Books of Secrets.

This lecture tells the stories of alchemy and adventure behind some our most beautiful and colourful paintings.

Lynne Gibson has worked as an independent art historian for the past ten years. Prior to that she lectured in art history at both Bristol and Sussex universities, taught in schools and sixth form colleges and ran painting, drawing and printmaking courses in art colleges. She has also worked professionally as an etcher and a painter in oils, exhibiting in the British Museum, the Guild Gallery in Bristol and the Barbican in London.




