



CLERGY LETTER

Ascension Day

A wonderful and important festival it may be, but I have always found Ascension Day slightly awkward. This year it is on 9th May and, as always, it is a Thursday and so seems to be very neglected, not falling on a Sunday.

And the second reason is the depictions of it in art and children's books, with Jesus shooting up into the sky like some Apollo rocket, which hardly gives it the awe, dignity and majesty that it deserves. In reality, the Greek in Luke and the Acts of the Apostles, both of which have descriptions of it, has much more the sense of 'withdrawing from the disciples' sight' than any take off into the sky.

And this is the importance of it. At Christmas we celebrate God coming to earth and taking on our flesh as the baby, born of Mary. At Ascension we are celebrating the end of Jesus' life on earth as he slips from the earthly dimension to the heavenly. While on earth he was confined by time and space but now he is in the heavenly dimension he is no longer confined and can be with us wherever we are and into eternity.

And the other important thing to note is that there is no evidence in the biblical accounts that Jesus changed at all in his nature as he rose. So he was and is still as he was after he rose from the dead, where we know he was transformed in some extraordinary way. There was still a physicality about him, as he was recorded as being able to be touched, to have eaten and cooked a meal, so he was certainly not a ghost of just a spirit. But equally he was not recognised by his closest friends and could appear and disappear from locked rooms, so his body had not just resuscitated while he was in the tomb, but was changed in a miraculous way. And, as he showed doubting Thomas, he still had the marks of his crucifixion in his hands and feet.

So Ascension Day shows us that he is still alive, still in his resurrected and transformed body, but now in the heavenly dimension, at the right hand of God, able to be close by and walk alongside each of us through all our lives.

Let us all try to mark this important day, with praise and thanksgiving to our living Lord, and perhaps, if nothing else, say the special prayer for the day:

Grant, we pray, Almighty God,
That as we believe your only begotten Son,
Our Lord Jesus Christ
To have ascended int the heavens,
So we in heart and mind may also ascend.
And with him continually dwell;
Who is alive and reigns with you,
In the unity of the Holy Spirit,
One God, now and forever,
Amen

Dear All, We are working hard to send the next contribution in July to the schools in South Sudan that The St Timothy Foundation supports. The funds are being divided, through the decision from the local Archbishop's consultation with the Bishop of Nzara, to give a very small salary to the teachers of two primary schools that are meeting 'under the mango trees'. The majority of the support though continues to be for the teaching at The St Timothy's pre-Primary and Primary School. Education is key in the Archbishop's strategy to bring the people out of poverty.

The Microfinance programmes are proceeding well after receiving a capital injection last November as many more women are now able to start a small business to finance food and clothes for their families.

Thank you to all of you who supported St Timothy's at Pewsey Tea Rooms on Easter Monday despite the weather! We are hoping for better weather in May when we will be opening the Pewsey Tea Rooms on both May Bank Holidays ie. 6th May and 27th May from 10am – 2pm with a Plant Stall outside. Hand Bells Now Being Rung In The Pewsey Vale

I have been asked to write a short piece on how we, the Pewsey Vale Hand Bell Ringers, came into being, what we are doing and how you might become involved, if you are interested in creating music on these most melodic of musical instruments. If I had been asked to do this 12 months ago it would not have been possible, as we have only been in existence, as a hand bell choir, since August 2023.



It was in March 2023 when I was talking to Alison Kent, the clerk to

the Parish Council in Pewsey, she told me she had a friend who was looking to pass on 'some hand bells', with no more detail than that. She knew I was a church bell ringer and I thought we could possibly use them to practice our ringing methods without the need to make quite so much noise, and that we could do it anywhere. I told her I was interested and thought no more of it, until.... About 2 months later I had a call from Alison to tell me the hand bells had arrived and could I collect them from the Parish Office, oh, and I ought to bring the car...

On arrival we were greeted with 7 sturdy wooden cases, 8 large fabric covered foam cushions, and a large black case, full of music for hand bells. To say that my wife and I were overwhelmed is an understatement. We opened the wooden cases to reveal a total of 46 hand bells, 3 ½ octaves of beautifully crafted chromatic bells in custom-made cases. We honestly did not believe we would ever become the guardians of such an amazing set of musical instruments.

We took them home and I began by inspecting each bell, checking it over, with the help of various YouTube videos, to even begin to understand exactly what we had. They had not been played for a few years, following the disbanding of their previous choir, and several did need some work, replacing clapper tension springs and setting up. I was keen to get in contact with the previous owners to find out where they had been used, who the choir was and any more information on the history of these hand bells.

I wrote a letter to the previous owner and found out they were rung by a choir called The Corum Ringers, who were based around the Rochester area in Kent. They had not been rung for about 10 years and the cases of hand bells, along with the accompanying paraphernalia, had been in storage in various lofts for many years. They had decided to pass them on, in the hope that they would be rung again for the enjoyment of others. And that is where we came in...

We collected the hand bells in mid-May, spent some time refurbishing them and YouTubing how to ring them, looked into how to access music for them and joined the Hand Bell Ringers of Great Britain (HRGB) to gain access to their vast resources of music, FAQs, contacts, insurance and so much more. To be honest, although I have been a church bell ringer for more than 15 years the difference between church bells and these 'tiny' hand bells is really worlds apart, and I had to develop a whole new set of skills, and be able to show others how to ring them too. Was I having second thoughts? Who wouldn't!

From our church bell ringers, there were 6-8 people who had expressed an interest in ringing the hand bells, some of them had experience of ringing hand bells but no-one had rung recently. This was enough, with my wife and me, to organise a taster evening at the Church Room in St. John's, Pewsey. At that first

meeting, in August, everything was very tentative, we started by learning how to hold the bells, one in each hand, what the action should look like to ensure a consistent sound from the bell, how to 'damp' the bell to prevent it ringing on, working out who preferred to work with smaller or larger bells and gradually

worked towards ringing 'rounds' on 12 bells, 6 ringers with a bell in each hand. We also learned to treat these little marvels with respect, not clanging them together, not dropping them, practicing lifting and placing them down safely. With each of the bells having an average replacement value of around £500 it does tend to focus the mind.



We decided to meet once a week to

practice for an hour, at each practice we started with beautiful rounds to get warmed up and make sure the bells were OK! We started to work our way through some of the music downloaded from the HRGB in number notation and we began to become more relaxed as the tunes began to emerge, playing both melody and harmony. As we were practicing mainly Christmas Carols, it was decided to offer to play at the Pewsey Medieval Market on the 2nd December. This would be our first public performance which, of course, adds some additional pressure to a choir who had never rung hand bells in public before.

At the Medieval Market, we were scheduled to play for 30-40 minutes at the start of proceedings, we had also involved a couple of members of the Pewsey Male Voice Choir to lead the audience singing so that we could accompany the carol singers, making for a great opportunity for us to concentrate on the playing while the audience sang the carols. This worked even better than we had hoped and everyone had a great time. Several people approached us afterwards and said how wonderful it was to hear hand bells in the church again (apparently, the church used to have a set of hand bells but they had been stolen).

Since then we have continued to meet weekly, mainly at Pewsey Church on a Monday evening from 6:30-7:30pm, but we have also practised in St. Mary's, Upavon too. We have moved on from Christmas Carols for the moment and expanded our repertoire enormously. Most of our current group come from the Upavon area and we are keen to involve as many other local people, who would like to learn, or return, to hand bell ringing, as possible, even creating an additional practice based at St. Mary's, if the demand is high enough.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank everyone who has learned to ring with us, who has supported us and to the very generous Corum Ringers for giving us the chance to learn an amazing new skill and present us with such an awesome challenge. We are a group who rings for pleasure, who are quite happy to make mistakes in the knowledge that we have all been there before you, to enjoy making music through the medium of hand bells, and above all to have fun while learning and playing. We do ask for a nominal donation for each practice session to help cover insuring the bells, printing music and administration.

NURTURE NATURE

With the Middle East wars prominent in World News, Foreign Secretaries come to mind. Many of us in our history lessons at school will remember the now famous quote of Sir Edward Grey in August 1914 at the pending outbreak of the Great War. On 3rd August, having explained cogently in Parliament why Great Britain had to go to war with Germany he returned to the Foreign Office. At dusk he could see from his desk the lamp man igniting the lamps in St James's Park. He remarked to his secretary 'The lamps are going out all over Europe, we shall not see them lit again in our lifetime'. However, as well as holding a high State office he was a countryman at heart, and a great lover of Nature and an eminent ornithologist,

studying robins when up at Oxford and elsewhere, and stone curlews on the family estate in Northumberland. He fed the birds at all the properties he was associated with as well as closer studies of wild fowl whilst at his beloved fishing cottage in Hampshire. Whilst Foreign Secretary he meticulously studied the flora and fauna of St James's Park. One morning the water bailiff took Grey to see a Little Grebe's newly hatched brood. Mother Dabchick, rather concerned at the presence of humans, clucked to her



chicks, which paddled over to her and all got onto her back and under her wings, and with them thus concealed she swam away to the safety of the reeds. So, it was as an ornithologist of some standing that Grey should also be remembered as he had a 'Special Relationship' with Nature and wrote about such knowledgeably and charmingly. Our connection with Grey of 110 years ago, when Great Britain was at the height of her industrial power, the world's population was billions less than now and global warming would have appeared gobbledegookish with thoughts backwards in time to the then little studied Planet's hot and cold periods over millions of years. Why, it is robins! Some residents have noticed a decline in the number of these iconic birds over the recent winter of extreme inclement weather, freezing periods but mainly due to excessive rainfall resulting in flooded habitats and environments, thereby reducing food sources and shelter over prolonged periods. More wind storms than usual wiping out early nesters and ever-changing climate patterns - all have made real inroads in bird and wildlife numbers pretty well over all continents. Thereby, it is our duty to do all we can to protect, help and regenerate our environment for wildlife. Let's hope the migrant numbers will be better this year, and the dawn choruses stronger. To assist in identifying and aiding songbirds www.songbird-survival.org.uk is a useful source

NOTE It may be of interest to know that Sir Edward Grey was the first British politician to establish the 'special relationship' with the United States. With the help of a song bird common to both Britain and the US, whilst on a walk with the former President of the US, Theodore Roosevelt, in the New Forest. Roosevelt heard a bird song which he recognised as the bird was also a resident in his country. The bird – the tiny Gold Crested Wren! Let's trust that this 'special relationship' remains strong in helping to solve the current difficulties in the world.

PEWSEY VALE ARTS SOCIETY

The Arts Society - Pewsey Vale will hold their May lecture on Tuesday 7th May at 2.30pm in the Bouverie Hall. The lecture is entitled, "A Window into Russia: A History of the Hermitage Museum," by Dr Rosamund Bartlett.

The lecture charts the history of one of the world's largest museums, from its foundation in 1751, through to the 21st century. From Catherine the Great and other Tsars' voracious appetites for collecting, plus the addition of priceless collections acquired after the 1917 October Revolution, the museum's eventful history provides a revealing window into the pecularities of Imperial and Soviet Russia.

Rosamund Bartlett is a writer, scholar, lecturer, cultural historian and translator specialising in Russian Literature. She has written biographies of both Tolstoy and Chekhov, has translated Anna Karenina and is a Trustee of The Anton Chekov Foundation. She lectures regularly on Russian art.

Pewsey Vale will hold their June lecture on Tuesday 4th June in the Bouverie Hall. The lecture is entitled, "Off the Record: Album Cover Art 1950 - 2000". The speaker is Rupert Dickens.

Some of the most iconic images of the 20th century were created, not for galleries, or private patrons, but for record sleeves. The zebra crossing immortalised on the cover of the Beatles' "Abbey Road" album has become a place of pilgrimage. This talk will explore the art of the album cover and reveal the close connections between visual and musical creativity, in this vibrant period of popular culture. Album covers have been designed by artists such as Andy Warhol, Peter Blake, Yoko Ono and a host of other artists and designers.



Rupert Dickens is an art historian with a special interest in European 16th and 17th century painting. He is an accredited lecturer for The Arts Society and works at the Wallace Collection as a guide, conducting public and private tours and lecturing on aspects of the collection. He also accompanies groups on art-themed tours to the Netherlands, Belgium, France and Italy.




